1. Executive summary

Lake Macquarie City Council is developing its Community Strategic Plan 2025-2035 (CSP), Council's highest-level plan that sets out the community's vision and aspirations for the future. The CSP outlines key strategies and actions required to achieve these aspirations.

Council's community engagement program to develop the CSP included running its second '100 Voices' community summit. Council engaged Lake Macquarie-based community engagement consultancy Spectrum Comms and Micromex Research to work with them to bring together 100 people from different backgrounds across the local government area to discuss their vision and aspirations for the next ten years and beyond.

The 100 Voices community summit was held on Saturday 20 April 2024 from 9am to 1pm at Rathmines Theatre. A total of 89 participants attended the summit (from a recruited 117) and took part in several workshop activities designed to help shape the future of the city.

The approach of forming a representative group of people was challenging due to difficulties reaching diverse stakeholder groups, particularly young people, however the process resulted in a dynamic and productive community engagement experience for both Council and participants. The high-level rain event on the day, along with a number of late withdrawals due to illness, accounts for the drop in attendance from the recruited 117.

Participants made thoughtful and innovative suggestions, and assisted in defining community priorities for Lake Mac, to help map out the strategies and actions that will achieve the community's long-term vision for the city. This feedback will be used to inform the development of Council's CSP and other strategic documents.



2. Why 100 Voices?

The success of the 2022 100 Voices community summit which Council held to discuss how it could improve the way it engages with the Lake Mac community, led Council to host a similar event to develop their new CSP.

Attempting to get 100 people in a room on the one day presented a challenge. However, thanks to a large campaign promoted through Council and through the recruitment by Micromex Research. 472 community members expressed their interest to take part in the community summit.

A total of 117 people were chosen through an independent process, which selected participants based on their demographic data, aiming to make the group demographically representative of the Lake Macquarie community profile.

From the 117 people selected and invited to the event, 89 people confirmed and attended.

3. Recruitment and selection process

Recruitment

The recruitment and selection process for Lake Mac's 100 Voices was undertaken by Central Coast-based market and community research specialists, Micromex Research and Lake Macquarie City Council.

An expression of interest was developed in the form of an invitation flyer, asking people to register their interest to participate in the community summit. A copy of the flyer is provided in **Appendix A**.

As part of Council's biennial Community Satisfaction Survey, which was in the field in February-March 2024, Council included a recruitment question asking participants if they would like to attend the 100 Voices summit. Additional participants were recruited from 1400 previous research projects in Lake Macquarie undertaken by Micromex, where residents agreed to be recontacted for follow-up surveys.

Micromex Research supplemented the mail-out by also reaching out to the previous attendees of Council's 2022 summit.

The option to submit an expression of interest was also promoted on the following channels:

- Lake Mac Council social media channels
- Council's online engagement platform
 Shape Lake Mac
- Council's e-newsletters
- Council's Youth Council

Expressions of interest closed on Friday 12 April 2024. In total, 472 expressions of interest were received.

Selection process

Of the 504 expressions of interest received, 117 people were selected who, collectively, best represented Lake Macquarie's demographic profile.

While the aim was always to have 100 voices in the room, 117 people were selected to help ensure the minimum of 100 people may be met, if some people were unable to attend due to unforeseen circumstances.

An information pack was sent to each of the participants to officially invite them to take part in Lake Mac's 100 Voices. 117 people accepted the invitation. A copy of the Information Pack is provided in **Appendix B**.

An email and phone call/message to invitees the day before the community summit were sent as a final reminder. A total of 89 people attended the event.

An email was also sent to people who were not selected, to thank them for their interest.



Demographics of attendees


GENDER

Out of the 89 people who attended Lake Mac's 100 Voices 55 per cent were female, 43 per cent were male, one per cent were non-binary and one per cent preferred not to self-identify.



AGE

Out of the 89 people who attended Lake Mac's 100 Voices, the age group between 35 and 49 and 50 and 64 had the equal highest representation sitting at 33 per cent. There were 16 per cent aged between 65 and 74, 9 per cent aged between 25 and 34 and 4 per cent were aged between 18-24.






LANGUAGES



LIVING SITUATION



TIME SPENT LIVING IN LAKE MACQUARIE

Out of the 89 people who attended Lake Mac's 100 Voices, 47 per cent have lived in Lake Macquarie for more than 20 years, 23 per cent for six to 10 years and 2 per cent for less than two years.



4. Workshop activities

Attendees were welcomed to the summit by Lake Macquarie Mayor Cr Kay Fraser, who thanked participants for their attendance and outlined the role of the Community Strategic Plan in shaping the future of the city.

The first workshop activity was designed to 'test the tech' that was being used to gather feedback in two of the workshop sessions. The online platform Mentimeter allows participants to see their responses and the responses of the wider group presented on the screen in real time. A simple light-hearted series of questions was used to test the tech and have participants get used to the two different types of Mentimeter questions (single response multiple choice and open ended with optional multiple responses). Participants also had the option of providing hard copy feedback, if they preferred not to use technology. The opening questions and results are presented below:




Figure 1. A total of 86 responses were received.




Figure 4. A total of 311 responses from 79 respondents. A total of 9 likes.

A facilitator-led group discussion followed this question, allowing participants the opportunity to provide further insights into the top themes that emerged. Comments captured from the group discussion included:

- Concerns raised about the sustainability of development and how to maintain it, as growth occurs within the city.
- Concerns about how town planners may approve development at the expense of green space.
- Suggestions made around new developments like affordable housing where
 properties are designed with limited backyards resulting in a reliance on clothes
 dryers. Approval of new residential dwellings should give reference to sustainability
 sensitive architectural design.
- Our infrastructure should not just be sensitive to humans. Wildlife corridors should be considered so we can all exist together.

A facilitator led group discussion again followed this question, allowing participants the opportunity to provide some further insights into the top themes that emerged. The facilitator also asked for some further insights into the theme of diversity. Comments captured from the group discussion included:

- Infrastructure better integration of public transport (two comments made on this subject)
- The impact of more development and in-turn, more housing, means that there are more cars on the road. Adequate investment in public roads is important.

- Funding for the Glendale Interchange.
- Walkable cities adequate footpaths for people to get around
- As much as we would like to focus on public transport, getting people out of their cars will be hard
- Diversity cohesive spaces for neuro-divergent people.
- Diversity is public spaces including unisex toilets




Figure 6. A total of 322 responses from 84 respondents. A total of 17 likes.

A facilitator led group discussion again followed this question, allowing participants the opportunity to provide some further insights into the top themes that emerged. The facilitator also asked for some further insights into the theme of community. Comments captured from the group discussion included:

- We need to look at infrastructure from a holistic perspective including pedestrian access, moving away from reliance on cars, water, sewer, internet and electricity. It's more than just roads.
- Social infrastructure how we connect as people. This is can be hard to measure and hard to see but includes investment in social welfare, isolated communities and support structures. Putting care and support services in the right areas which may not always be centralised locations. For example, Western Lake Macquarie needs more services.
- Community ferry service connecting one side of the lake to the other. This could be useful for accessing health services.
- Better footpaths for Morisset
- More holistic approach to infrastructure. This includes what Council is responsible for and what the State Government can offer financial support for. Council to campaign to the State Government to get more resources we need and then Council can clearly explain what commitment and limitations there are in pursuing these avenues.

A facilitator-led group discussion again followed this question, allowing participants the opportunity to provide some further insights into the top themes that emerged. The facilitator also asked for some further insights into the theme of community. Comments captured from the group discussion included:

- We currently undersell ourselves in the tourism industry.
- Tourism infrastructure to bring people here and support for tourism operators to show off Lake Macquarie to others.
- Development in Morisset. We have so many natural tourism assets but when we
 develop more tourism assets, we need to make sure the infrastructure is there to
 support it.
- We need to balance tourism with existing local business needs. For example, tourism
 activation spaces at Warners Bay leave limit parking and access for the permanent
 businesses.
- The Happiness Factor We don't need to reinvent the wheel in Lake Macquarie. When you look at other cities around the world, we already have so many positive things.
- There is not a better Council in the world.
- We have a lot of different villages, and we don't want to become Sydney's aged care
 facility. We recognise that it's a great place to retire, buts that's not all we want. There
 are opportunities to do big things in the development space that still balances the
 commercial, environmental and employment opportunities. Example cited Black
 Rock Motor Park.
- We like living here for a reason and we don't want to lose that space with densification. Example cited – Cardiff multi-storey development. If we want what we have to be better, it's not just about growth. If we want more, more, more, this means, more people, more cars and more houses.
- Commercial retail developers need to be more responsible for the impact they have on the community. Example, when thinking about parking and environmental spaces, they need to be more collaborative with the community.
- No more next stage development until all 7.11 Contributions are spent.
- High density development needs to give adequate consideration to emergency service access (relevant for ageing population), and waste services.
- No 'tick-a-box' approach to open and green space. Example cited you can't plant a native tree into an existing car space and credit it as greens space.

 Accountability on where developer contributions are spent on local services and infrastructure. Example cited – Catherine Hill Bay and Rose Group development.

4.2 Activity 2- Persona adoption and vision boards

There were 10 tables of participants in the room and each table was provided with a 'Persona Pack'. Participants were assigned a table number at registration, which enabled Council to have a range of demographics at each table. 


Figure 10: Lucas and Suji persona description




Figure 12: Smith family persona description




Figure 13: Smith family vision board (sheet 1)




Figure 14: Smith family vision board (sheet 2)




Figure 16: Lucy's persona description




Figure 18: Jason's persona description




Figure 19: Jason's vision board (sheet 1)




Figure 20: Jason's vision board (sheet 2)




Figure 21: Jason's vision board (sheet 3)




Figure 23: Sarah and Katrina's vision board




Figure 24: Sarah and Katrina's vision board




Figure 26: Bob and Mary's vision board (sheet 1)




Figure 26: Bob and Mary's vision board (sheet 2)




Figure 27: Robyn's persona description




Figure 28: Robyn's vision board




Figure 29. Andrew's persona description




Figure 30: Andrew's vision board



4.2.1 Capturing more community visions

- seriously ambitious
- adaptable
- inclusive
- unique to Lake Mac
- achievable

This was hard won knowledge for strategic vision development and should not be lost.

Everyone must take responsibility for flow-on effects of condensed development. Our shared values include space, sustainability, leisure and recreation, but these must be made accessible to all in their local areas.

LGBT+ inclusion.

Would love a local radio station - closest currently is NewFM who focuses more on Newy. More opportunities for advertisements of markets, live music, workshops, etc. I had no idea 'Curious Minds' was on at Swansea Library and I worked on it!

Updated bus schedules - 259 not on current schedules. Mystery bus?

Protection of cultural/historical assets e.g. Wallsend history, rock carvings in Sugar Valley, petrified forest at Blackalls Park...

Public and private EV Charging stations.

- Speers Point Park/other parks
- Costco
- Bunnings

Reduced building height for medium density development

More and access friendly doctors and medical facilities. Provide bulk billing/affordable option for everyone.

Please protect large tree cover. Please plant more and protect their green spaces. It takes 20 years to grow out 20-year-old tree!

Provide the same level of service to outlying areas that are provided to more populated areas.

Integrated transport system to enable people to get more services (currently takes two hours + to travel from Morisset/Cooranbong up to Toronto].

Planned and integrated tourism development.

E.g. Cedar Mill, 30,000 people, no accommodation, no transport, inadequate roads.

Walkability is not just about footpaths it's about having people close to the stuff. Mix use is necessary for walkability.

Family size apartments!! Modern apartments are often exclusively made for singles/couples, so families are forced to suburbia even if they prefer a large apartment and the walkability associated.

Don't forget to consider noise pollution. Suburbia is isolating. Cars induce congestion. Parking spaces are unproductive land use.

Transit - to get here with public transport only I would have to have left home at 5:00pm yesterday. Luckily, I was able to borrow a car and it only took 22 minutes.

Regarding the disability community more so the independent disabled person, I suggest Council planners engage more with people with disabilities to connect facilities more for our disabled community.

Spend a day in a wheelchair getting around Lake Mac with *no* carer to see how disabled people are impacted.

A strong vision and courageous policies.

Lake Mac is a series of villages and towns around 174 km loop.

A strategy that has at its core DECENTRALISATION + COOPERATION.

e.g. Australia's energy system is moving from centralised generation (coal power stations) to decentralised generation – rooftop solar and utility solar. It can be done!

Bring back roadside collections. If necessary, cut back to once a year, but don't take it away. You've cut off the elderly, those without access to utes or vans and no money to rent them, etc.

Has Council done an audit of buildings/land that has already been cleared/built on for possible homes for community groups/individuals who are struggling to find accommodation. E.g. tiny homes, shared homes, disability group houses, indigenous cultural homes etc.

We need more and better mental health/ medical facilities that is accessible for everyone. We need more support for people with mental health illnesses and not keep throwing them by the wayside.

More focus on "Third spaces" (i.e. somewhere away from home or work that people can exist in). Free public spaces.

Tiny home villages

- Giving low-income people the opportunity to own their own home
- Shared gardens/facilities
- Eco-friendly
- Community
- Intergenerational or neurodiverse

More free or cheap workshops, especially catering to a wider range of people. Currently catered to elderly and children.

Noone can afford \$\$\$ high cost out of pocket for workshops and new skills.

- Council bureaucracy needs to be made more accountable. Particularly regarding DA variations.
- Solar panel should be mandatory on all new developments.
- Community batteries as part of all new subdivisions.

More funding over other side of lake

stop focusing on Warners Bay side.

Stop neglecting public parks Toronto side.

Continue offering free cultural, art and music-based experiences.

Make Warners Bay foreshore" work". Divert road around cafe strip an expand foreshore strip services.

Public transport came up a lot in discussions... but it needs to be <u>much better</u> than using the car! Who wants to give up their car???

The impact of Black Rock, in terms of noise and impact to wildlife needs to be considered as the site is developed.

More availability for residents to discuss concerns with Council members and feel like we are heard.

Council rates - working within budget is not an "and/or" decision with other requirements. It's mandatory.

- More focus on public transport and walkability
- Move away from cars.
- Public ferry

More e-bike locations further from lakeside.

More walking trails and dog safe trails to go with them.

Consider shared walk/cycle paths on busy routes – e.g. Dudley Rd to Charlestown Square :)

They have their own small backyard for growing veggies or a place to sit with friends, plants and greenery.

Please encourage and promote head offices and services (locations?) based on clients' needs.

I once did an urban and regional planning course at uni. One thing that stuck with me is what we do is dependent on what is outside our doors. Is there a footpath? Bus stop or rail line nearby? Could I safely ride a bike to the local shops? Do I have to drive the car? If council wants to encourage active transport and all public transport – first, consider what people can see when they look outside. Make it a viable option and people will use it.

Innovative recycling systems - e.g. grey water and (not legible) awareness of temperatures in urban areas - e.g. green roofs

Please fix Five Islands bridge/Speers Point roundabout for commuters.

I would like to ride a bike from Rathmines to Toronto and return.

Presently it is not safe for me to do this on the current roadway.

A foot path cycleway connecting villages would improve overall health an improved tourism. :)

Implementation of some wildlife corridors in critical areas.

Important issues:

- Community care and health care and wellbeing.
- Consult and listen to very young children in lake Macquarie through early Ed. settings and families.

Recycling facilities for soft plastics on the eastern side of the lake ASAP.

I want to hear about local events, I sign up to Lake Mac emails, yet I still miss out. Bulletin boards at libraries? Post offices? Ads?

Footpaths in Coal Point, Kilaben Bay and Carey Bay. We have more than paid for them in our rates over and over again.

We talk about promoting Lake Mac as a tourist destination and we have the Catherine Hill Bay jetty falling down.

Restore it, put a few small cafes along its length. Promote scuba diving - this will bring jobs & tourism & money.

If this is above Council, then be the champion and get funding from whomever is responsible be proactive.

More visibility about environmental impact and sustainability. How are we fixing what we've already caused and where we are going in the future.

Road issues – i.e. bottleneck from Warner's Bay > Speers Point, 1 lane > 2 lanes > 1 lane > 2 lanes in (??) zoom.

Go back to roadside rubbish pickup.

Please plan for an mitigate predicted major weather events. Floods, extreme heat events and bushfires are expected to increase in frequency. This will exacerbate all existing problems.

Light rail - Newcastle - 2 kilometres - state government dictated.

Local council could have lobbied hard for 15 shuttle buses to do the loop that included over to beaches – Cooks Hill and Merewether.

Lake Mac could have shuttles doing loops – (pax 15-20). LAKE & VILLAGE SHUTTLES –

- 1) Around Lake Mac every 15 mins.
- 2) Around each village 2 days per week.
- 3) Around Lake Mac (8am > 12 noon > 4pm >8pm >12am)4 shuttles = 1/hr8 shuttles + 1/ half hour

At 92 villages. Each village 2 days/week.

 $92 \times 2 + 184 \text{ days}/7 \text{ days} = 26 \text{ shuttles.}$ So, testing this -26 shuttles operating 7 days per week = 182 days of shuttles send these to 92 villages - each village gets (182/92 = 2 days per village).

Pool resources management can empower community and steer towards localised solutions.

To achieve these goals our public and private community venues need ongoing support and financial assistance. For example – a reduction in rates and levees

People visit Lake Macquarie for tourism experiences. Do we have enough accommodation for hosting large events. Do we have the necessary accessibility?

Community goal discussed: Council collaborates with businesses, government organisations and our community to improve our city

We need to celebrate our fresh local produce. We need to support farmers markets.

Can we have cross motion with other councils. Do we have a cohesive regional advisory board?

We need to diversify advertising for our events inside and outside our community.

Community goal discussed: <u>As a community, we value and celebrate our history, cultures and people</u>

We need to support and celebrate the history, culture, and people of our community. Lake Macquarie has a diverse history and many multicultural constituents.

We need to acknowledge the diversity of our food, music, dress, language and arts. That may look like food festivals, cultural days that are a separate showcase for celebrations.

We need to speak about our past. What about cultural tours, or a jump on/jump off shuttle experience. Celebrate the importance of Indigenous storytelling and retaining cultural significance or important sights.

What challenges do you think we might face on our journey to achieving success? How might we overcome these challenges.

Challenges can be apathy and pessimism. Lake Macquarie is not one homogenous area – it is not just Speers Point or Warners Bay.

What does that mean to you? What does it look like?

This looks like listening to the storytellers in our local communities. We need to use the local expert in fields that work here. Council needs to hold open door conversation with developers for transparency

What does success look like? How will we know if it is achieved?

Success is accurately reflecting the wide variety of needs/experiences of our community. Yes – we agree that to grow we need to develop opportunities.

Regarding business development - what happens after grants I received? We need ongoing advocacy for the people of Lake Macquarie - not just short-term gains. We need stronger state government investment in our region. Need to ensure that election funding flows into Lake Macquarie after the election is over."

What challenges do you think we might face on our journey to achieving success? How might we overcome these challenges.

One challenge is the distance between villages around Lake Macquarie and the diversity of needs between each village. Different areas have different metrics of success.

For example – the meaning of growth for one person may be different to another person in the same community.

There is a struggle to balance the need for immediate gratifications - versus the length of time between receiving funds and seeing results. This can take five-plus years.

We only have a small bucket of funds but large geographical area with large needs for support and even large infrastructure requirements.

We need to prioritise what is important in a democratic fashion. We may have 100 voices in this room today but that is still very small representation of people in our community.

Our research needs to be completed in a timely fashion and present factual evidence and give the community opportunity to respond as well.

We need to know the difference between true collaboration and versus just getting the job done. Lastly, we need to balance projected growth vs. The reality of what that looks like for Lake Mac.

4.4 Activity 4 – Prioritising draft community goals

In the final workshop activity, participants were asked to rank their top five most important community goals from the list of 14 by using Mentimeter. The results below show the most important community goal is balancing the city's growth and working together to protect the natural environment.




Figure 33. Ranking of top five community goals

A facilitator-led discussion was held where the group as a whole were asked if these results were a surprise, or whether there were any other comments. Comments included that participants were not surprised that balancing growth and protecting the natural environment was such a high priority and there was some surprise that Council being financially sustainable was not higher as this was essential to getting everything else right. There were, however, comments that people visiting Lake Macquarie for incredible holidays was not a priority because residents were likely wanting to keep their area a secret.



5.0 Key findings

The 100 Voices Community Summit has provided insights and ideas on what Lake Mac residents see the city's priorities should be over the next 10 to 20 years. Thinking apirationally and working together to create long-term visions for the city came easily to the 100 who embraced their new personas and created vision boards that showed genuine engagement.

Feedback on the city's future centred on the need for sustainable infrastructure that balances the desire to grow but maintain the lifestyle that keeps Lake Macqaurie residents living in and loving the area.

A list of the key themes from the 100 Voices summit is provided below:

- Sustainable growth consideration given to ensuring the appropriate infrastructure is in place to support new development.
- Infrastructure transport and public transport featured heavily, as did social services infrastructure and a need to have services located where needed.
- A holistic approach to infrastructure.
- Building partnerships with other tiers of government and agencies.
- Sustainable and affordable housing.
- Accessibility and diversity acknowledgement of neuro diverse and LGBTQI+ residents with appropriate services and amenities.

Participants ranked balancing the city's growth and working together to protect the natural environment as their top community goal, along with feeling connected to each other and the city, and making sure Council is financially sustainable.

6.0 Next steps

The 100 Voices Community Summit was part of a wider consultation and engagement program to gather feedback and support the development of Council's Community Strategic Plan 2025-2035 and other strategic documents. Council will use the feedback from the summit, along with input from a series of Council-run community engagement activities, to develop a draft CSP.

The opportunity for community feedback will continue. A report on the draft strategy will be presented to Council in late 2024 which will recommend the strategy be placed on public exhibition, providing further opportunity for feedback.
